

Alta Heritage Foundation, a new non-profit organization, has been set up to take on the management and coordination of cremains recovery. ICF has stepped back from management; however, many of our canine teams are still active in the search for lost cremated remains. Cremated Remains Recovery

Free Service to Wildfire Victims

If you lost your home to wildfire and the cremated remains of a loved one were inside, a team of volunteer archaeologists and trained canines are able to help recover them. Our team is offering this service to wildfire victims at **NO COST**.

There are important actions that need to occur immedately to facilitate the recovery of your family member's cremated remains.

- Do not disturb the area by sifting through ashes.
- Protect the area from foot traffic or debris removal.
- Inform agency officals that human cremains are present on the property.
- Contact Alta Heritage Foundation as soon as possible.
- Visit the website to register for service, become a volunteer, or make a donaton.
