A Ray of Sunshine on a Cloudy Day

Sometimes the fates come together in ways that we don't understand. This happened in mid-October during the devastating fires in Northern California, Santa Rosa in particular. Let's digress for just a bit before we begin that story.

The Institute for Canine Forensics has a sister organization, the Canine Specialized Search Team (CSST). CSST specializes in cold cases and works as a resource to the Santa Clara County Office of the Sheriff providing human remains detection to law enforcement in Santa Clara County and, through the State mutual aid system, to other law enforcement agencies all over California. My dog Piper and I are one of the CSST teams. We were requested to work the aftermath of the fires in Santa Rosa, looking for those people reported missing after the fire.

Just before deploying to Santa Rosa, ICF received a call from an archaeologist, Alex DeGeorgey whose relatives had lost their home in the fire. Alex had learned about ICF and our capabilities from Dawn Johnson and Jaime Bach, who we have worked with for years. His relative, Curt Nichols, had lost his mother and father's cremains when their home burned to the ground. Curt was devastated that he had been unable to get his parents' ashes scattered, per their wishes, before the fire. Would the ICF dogs be able to help locate them? Our answer was "yes", but it might be a couple of weeks before we could get up there. Our priority had to be those who had died in the fire.

This is where the fates come in ... as luck would have it, Piper and I were assigned to work with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office in Santa Rosa. We worked throughout one day with two other CSST teams, helping to locate three victims of the fire's devastation. That evening we were demobilized and released.

I was able to contact Curt Nichols and his wife Barbara, and arrange to meet them near their home the next morning. Curt explained that he was hoping that we could locate the cremains in the 8" of ash that remained of their two-story home.

After doing a survey of the area and checking to make sure there were no hazardous materials in the burned-out home, we went to work. The fire department had been able to help Curt tape-off the location of the shed where the cremains had been stored, so we concentrated on that area. Piper soon alerted on the cremains.

No one was quite prepared to collect the ashes, so we had to improvise. I carry a box of Ziplock bags in my truck and Barbara was able to find a burned tuna can that was a remnant of her lunch the day before the fire, a tiny element of humor in a sad day. Curt and I worked together to collect as much of the co-

mingled cremains as possible.

As an added bonus, I was able to help recover a sugar bowl from each of their mothers' china sets, and a cast iron Dutch oven that was a family heirloom ... little treasures of the past, as they move forward in their recovery. We wish them all the best.

As a result of this becoming a human interest story in the Santa Rosa Press Democrat, ICF has requests from four more people in similar situations ... requests we hope to be able to meet in the next few weeks.

We are very excited to introduce Dana Timbrook & Sophie, Karen Atkinson & Echo and Larry Atkinson.


